Gates of Justice

Psalm 118, part of the Hallel service for Rosh Chodesh and festivals, is a triumphant exclamation of G!D's protection and love for the author. He need not fear his enemies, for the Holy One is with him. But in the middle of praises and platitudes, there is a request:

Open for me the gates of justice, I will enter them and praise Yah.

Within the context of the psalm, it can be read as more triumphalism, especially if "tzedek" is translated as "victory," which it often is. However, if read as "justice," it becomes a demand to G!D and a promise made by the self. If G!D opens the gates of justice, then I will enter and praise Yah. Yah, the Hebrew letters yud and hey, are the first two letters of G!D's complete name, Yud-Hey-Vav-Hey. Using "yah" might be an admission of incompleteness, that G!D's name cannot be whole without human beings fighting for justice.

How can we demand justice? From those in power? From ourselves? From G!D?
